Justice40

What is the Justice 40 Initiative?

President Biden made a historic commitment that 40% of Federal Government's investments benefit and flow to disadvantaged communities that are marginalized, underserved, and overburdened by pollution.

What kinds of investments fall within the Justice40 Initiative?

The categories of investment are: climate change, clean energy and energy efficiency, clean transit, affordable and sustainable housing, training and workforce development, remediation and reduction of legacy pollution, and the development of critical clean water and wastewater infrastructure.



How is Justice40 Initiative Implemented?

- The Biden Administration is transforming hundreds of federal programs to ensure that disadvantaged communities receive the benefits of new and existing Federal investments in these categories.
- Through the Inflation Reduction Act, Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, and the American Rescue Plan, federal agencies are making historic levels of investment to advance environmental justice.
- 15 U.S. Agencies have released their covered programs, including:




How do we think Justice40 can be improved?

- Justice40 Grant Award Scoring: Often the Justice40 grant scoring rubric is heavily weighted towards organizations with previous government grant experience, which many community based Latino organizations typically don't have. We are being discriminated against and not getting our fair share of these grant opportunities due how the grants are scored.
- Justice40 Grant State and Municipality Preference: The government grant preference towards states and municipalities is not the most effective means to disseminating grants and ensuring that Justice40 is benefiting the underserved and Latino communities that Justice40 is intending to serve. Community based organizations and other frontline organizations are better conduits of these funds. When money flows through state and local governments, these governments are usually not diverse and they don't know how to engage or communicate with the Latino community.
- Environmental Justice Advisory Perspective: We appreciate the emphasis placed on diversity and inclusion on these grants; however, it would also be beneficial to have an environmental justice perspective. Just because you are Brown or Black, doesn't mean you understand environmental justice.

What can be improved regarding Justice40... (Continued)

- Be Transparent & Don't Change the Eligibility Criteria: If these grants are intended for states and municipalities, say so. Community based organizations and nonprofits have limited resources. If we spend time and resources applying to grants that we have little chances of receiving, it is frustrating and wrong. We can be using our resources helping the community versus pursuing federal grants that are supposed to benefit our community.
- Make More Grants for Community Based Organizations/ Nonprofits: Nonprofits and frontline community based organizations are the best way to ensure the benefits of Justice40 reach our communities. We know our people. We know our needs. Yet the federal grants continue to ignore our connection to the community in favor of states and municipalities that are the reason why low income historically disadvantaged communities exit in the first place.
- **Create a Grant Oversight & Collect Data:** We need oversight in how much of the Justice40 funds are actually reaching our communities. The Administration says that 40% of all funds are supposed to "benefit" our community. Keep track of that data, and make it available to the public.

We ensure that the increasingly marginalized Latino/a/e community is not skipped over and to provide the resources to make President Biden's historic Justice40 commitment successful for all "disadvantaged communities," not just those that have been the most well-funded.

2) Seek out government grants

What is a grant?

A grant is a **way the government funds your ideas and projects** to provide public services and stimulate the economy. Grants support critical recovery initiatives, innovative research, and many other programs.

- Grants may be awarded by state or local agencies, private foundations, or corporations. Here, however, we will focus on grants from the federal government.
- There are several ways to participate in a grant- primary and secondary recipients
- While grants are not paid back, they are not free money. Funds should be spent responsibly and according to US government standards.





3) Be Primaries and Secondaries

- 1. Create a dual track approach one for primaries and one for secondaries.
- 2. Foster match-making and pairing opportunities.
- 3. Seek out donors to assist with grant support: writing, advising and preparation.
- 4. Promote grant opportunities.


Basics: Primary vs Secondary Grant Recipients

Primaries	Secondaries	
They have a UEI and CAGE Number	Usually don't have a UEI and CAGE Number	
Primaries are the ones who "hit send" on the application. They are usually the "convener" of the application. They decide who their partners will be and the program for which they are seeking funding.	They assist with the grant application and implementation. They can be technical partners and usually provide a letter of commitment in the grant application process.	
They are the main recipient of the grant and interact with the US government granting agency	Their funding flows through the primary grant recipient	
Should be in existence for 5+ years	Years in existence can vary	
Usually bigger organizations and have staff capacity to implement the grant	Usually smaller organizations with less staff capacity and resources

Creating Environmental Justice through Applying for Grants Together

Community Change Grant (On the Horizon)

The US EPA Community Change Grants will open in the next few weeks, offering about \$2 billion in funding

We are looking to gauge our membership, affiliates, etc about the possibility of working together toward the Community Change Grant to do the following:

- Climate resiliency and adaptation.
- Mitigating climate and health risks from urban heat islands, extreme heat, wood heater emissions, and wildfire events.
- Community-led air and other (including water and waste) pollution monitoring, prevention, and remediation.
- Investments in low- and zero-emission and resilient technologies and related infrastructure.
- Workforce development that supports the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions and other air pollutants.
- Reducing indoor toxics and indoor air pollution.

Community Change Grant (On the Horizon)

Goals of the grant program

- Deliver resources as soon as possible on the ground to communities and their partners.
- Meet communities at their needs and where they are in their journey.
- Prove that investments in communities are the best investments to solve the toughest problems in places with the biggest challenges.
- Achieve lasting, meaningful change on the ground.
- Be the bottom-up to all the other top-downs!

Community Change Grants are incorporating innovative competition features

- Reduce traditional evaluation process focus from just on how well applications are written by adding an oral presentation evaluation component to enhance ability of capacity constrained organizations to receive awards
- 12-month rolling application process with various program offerings at different amounts that applicants can access when ready.

Community Change Grant (On the Horizon)

How to prepare for this funding opportunity

- Find your partners
- Build your coalitions
- Identify meaningful transformative projects implementing strategies to help address environmental and climate justice concerns within 3 years
- Identify governmental policies and programs that can be improved with community voices
- Activate SAM.gov and Grants.gov registration now

Applying together:

- A partnership between at least two community-based non-profit organizations (CBOs).
- A partnership between a CBO and one or any combination of the following:
- a Federally-Recognized Tribe
- a local government
- an institution of higher education.

We are working on gathering approximately 10-20 community based partners to apply together

Project / Award Categories

Project / Award Categories

The NOFO will have two tracks

- <u>Multi-Projects</u>: Multifaceted holistic vision of projects addressing a variety of environmental and climate justice challenges along with education, engagement, workforce, capacity-building efforts
 - Applications must address some combination of categories (climate/pollution/workforce development) to make it multifaceted and of greatest benefit to communities
 - \circ \$10-20 M award range
- <u>Engagement-specific "Government Equity" projects</u>: Projects that focus specifically on advancing meaningful engagement between communities and government processes / institutions
 - Facilitate the engagement of disadvantaged communities in governmental processes (e.g., permitting advisory boards and ECJ academies)
 - \circ \$1-3 M award range

Overall Grant Recommendations, Other Opportunities & Resources

Federal Grant Applications Recommendations

- Start early.
- Enlist a robust team.
- Ensure your UEI and CAGE Number early, which you can do for free at <u>SAM.gov</u>
- Most federal grant notices and applications have templates for the forms, narratives, budgets, etc. that you will need to submit.
- Grant templates are usually available on Grants.gov or on the agency website.
- The government agency has a free webinar detailing the grant in which you are applying. Watch the webinar to learn more about it.
- Read the instructions carefully. Your application can be disqualified for something as simple as not using the correct font.
- Consider hiring a grant writer, if you can.
- Set roles for people on your team for the grant, and ensure everyone knows deadlines and responsibilities.
- Consider setting an internal deadline for 1-2 weeks before the application deadline for an internal review.
- Designate a person on your team to be in charge of submitting the grant application.

Technical Assistance

- <u>Community Change Grant Matchmaking</u>: Survey to gauge our membership about the possibility of working together toward the Community Change Grant.
- <u>Coalition Partner Projects (Spanish Link)</u>: Form to help to facilitate early sign up for technical assistance and to help people find partners.
- Environmental Protection Network Technical Assistance Program: Technical assistance on navigating the EPA, regulatory processes, the implications of federal policies, and government grants.
- <u>Thriving Communities Technical Assistance Centers Program TCTACS</u>: help underserved and overburdened communities across the country. Each of the technical assistance centers will receive at least \$10 million to remove barriers and improve accessibility for communities with environmental justice concerns.

Opportunities

- Urban and Community Forestry Grants: Aims to increase tree cover nationwide and enhance equitable access to trees and green spaces in disadvantaged communities.
- Inflation Reduction Act Community Change Grants Program: Funding will help support community-driven initiatives to reduce pollution, boost climate resilience, and enhance community capacity for communities most impacted by climate change, historical pollution, and disinvestment.
- Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund (GGRF): —a \$27 billion investment to mobilize financing and private capital to address the climate crisis, ensure our country's economic competitiveness, and promote energy independence while delivering lower energy costs and economic revitalization to communities that have historically been left behind.
